One Hundred years ago, in 1917, the United States broke its long-held neutrality and entered World War I. American airmen officially began flying operations in Europe under US command.

The fledgling branch was called the "Air Service of the American Expeditionary Force" and operated European-made aircraft, primarily of French and English design. In April 1917, the Air Service operated only three flying squadrons. By the end of that year, there were 53.

A handful of American pilots had seen combat prior to this, but these few were volunteers serving with the French Air Force in a group known as the Lafayette Escadrille. Upon America's entry into the war, these pilots were mostly absorbed into the newly formed squadrons of the AAS and fought under the US flag. They imparted their hard-earned battle lessons onto the rookie pilots just out of training.

Barnstormers

As hundreds of pilots returned home after WWI, many put their flying skills to work to grow America's infant aviation industry: building airports, flying clubs, airlines, air mail services, crop dusting, and more. Americans fell in love with all things related to speed, technology, and daring.

Barnstorming was a form of entertainment in which [stunt pilots](#) performed tricks, either individually or in groups called flying circuses. Devised to impress people with the skill of pilots and the sturdiness of planes, it became popular in the [United States](#) during the [Roaring Twenties](#). Barnstormers were pilots who flew throughout the country selling airplane

rides and performing stunts. Barnstorming "seemed to be founded on bravado, with 'one-upmanship' a major incentive."

Barnstormers performed a variety of stunts, with some specializing as stunt pilots or "aerialists." Stunt pilots performed a variety of [aerobatic maneuvers](#), including spins, dives, loop-the-loops and [barrel rolls](#), while aerialists performed feats of [wing walking](#), stunt [parachuting](#), midair plane transfers, or even playing [tennis](#), target shooting, and dancing on the plane's wings. Other stunts included nose dives and flying through barns.

Also: The 104th Fighter Wing of the Massachusetts Air National Guard is nicknamed the "Barnstormers" a play on the airport's name of Barnes... and evokes the skill and daring of those early aviators who thrilled and inspired all across America.

What You Need to Know for the 2017 Airshow

Saturday August 12 and Sunday 13

Parking lots open at 6:30 a.m.

Airshow security gates open at 8:00 a.m.

Flying performances will take place approximately from 10:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Airshow security gates will close at 5:30 p.m. and all spectators must exit by that time.

NEW SECURITY MEASURES FOR 2017

- All guests entering the Air Show will be screened with wands so please plan accordingly.
- All bags are subject to search. Security screeners will require guests to return any prohibited item to their vehicle before entering.
- Alternatively, there will be “Amnesty Boxes” at each entry point for prohibited items prior to screening. There are no returns of items left in Amnesty Boxes.
- Bicycles, roller skates, roller blades, scooters, skateboards, or hover boards
- No personal drones (i.e. quad or hex copters)
- Lasers or laser pointers
- Marijuana and federally banned substances such as illicit narcotics

PERMITTED ITEMS:

- One 12” x 12” bag, purse or tote per person
- Personal seat cushions, pads, and blankets
- Folding chairs, lawn chairs, etc.
- Strollers, wagons
- Binoculars and/or cameras, as well as their protective cases
- Empty beverage containers, Camelbacks, water bottles, etc. All must fit within 12”x12” size restriction.
- Commercially purchased, UNOPENED water bottles (e.g., Dasani, Aquafina, etc.) that are 1 Liter in size (approx. 33 oz.) or smaller

PROHIBITED ITEMS:

- Bags, purses, totes, backpacks & other types of baggage larger than 12” x 12”
- Weapons of any kind (regardless of permit) to include but not limited to: firearms, knives (including pocket knives and multi-tools), replica or toy weapons, pepper spray, mace, stun guns, and martial arts weapons.
- Outside alcoholic beverages
- Pop-up canopies
- Free-standing or beach umbrellas
- Coolers/ice chests are NOT permitted. An exception will be made for medically necessary items after proper inspection.
- Pets, other than credentialed service animals
- Glass containers

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Where is the 2017 Westfield International Air Show taking place?

A: The show is taking place at Westfield-Barnes Regional Airport, in Westfield, Massachusetts. The address is 110 Airport Road, Westfield, MA 01085.

Q: What is the cost of admission?

A: There is no cost for general admission. There will be a \$10 donation requested for parking.

Q: Will food & drink be available for purchase?

A: Yes. There will be a large variety of food and beverage choices, including vegetarian & gluten-free options. Credit cards will be accepted.

Q: Can I bring food?

A: Yes, however coolers are not permitted, so be sure to pack snacks that do not require an ice chest or cooler. There will be plenty of food available for purchase at the show and many varieties of food types to choose from.


Q: Do you have a children’s area?





Safety: How goes it?

Hello Barnestormers,

I would like to introduce to you our new Chief of Safety, Maj. Andrew “Shot Gun” Avery and to me.

Maj. Avery enlisted in the Air Force on Dec. 3, 1997, after completing a Bachelor’s of Science in Political Science. He became a heating, ventilation, air conditioning and refrigeration (HVAC/R) apprentice as an airman first class. His first duty station was at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., where he was accepted into Officer Training School. He went on to graduate in March of 2000 with a slot in Undergraduate Navigator Training at Naval Air Station Pensacola, Fla. Maj. Avery was selected as an F-15E Strike Eagle Weapons Systems Officer midway through his training at Pensacola. He attended the B-Course for F-15Es at Seymour-Johnson AFB, N.C. in 2001-2002 and was assigned to the 494th Fighter Squadron at Royal Air Force Lakenheath, UK.

While assigned to the 494th FS, he deployed to Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar in July of 2003 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom. In more than five months at Al Udeid, Maj. Avery flew 47 combat missions and accumulated over 240 combat hours in the F-15E. Shortly after returning from the deployment, he was selected to attend Undergraduate Pilot Training at Columbus AFB, Miss. At UPT, he was selected for fighters and eventually awarded a slot as a pilot in the World’s Greatest Air Superiority Fighter, the F-15C Eagle. After graduating from the B-Course at Tyndall AFB, Fla., he was assigned to Eglin AFB, where he spent almost three years as a member of the 60th and then 58th Fighter Squadrons.

Maj. Avery went on to spend three years at the 44th FS at Kadena AB, Okinawa, Japan, followed by 65th and 64th Aggressor Squadrons, and then 561st Joint Tactics Squadron at Nellis AFB, Nev. It was while serving at the 561st JTS that his fortune changed and he was hired by the 104th Fighter Wing. Maj. Avery swore into the Massachusetts Air National Guard on March 16, 2017 after 19 years and 3+ months on Active Duty. During those years, he met and married his wife, Kirstin, who is a former Intel Officer in the USAF, and hopeful future member of the 104 FW. While at Nellis, they had two children: their son, Duke, who is now four years old; and their daughter, Ryen, who just turned two years old. Their family could not be happier to be members of the Barnestormers and look forward to many years of service to the state and our nation.

I am Tech. Sgt. Angelica Mendoza, the new Occupational Safety Technician for the 104th Fighter Wing. I have been a member at Barnes for a little under eight years, with my first career field in Bioenvironmental Engineering within the Medical Group. I am currently pursuing my Degree in Occupational Safety and Health, prompting the decision to cross train into Occupational Safety. Becoming a member of the Wing Safety staff has been a great opportunity for me to continue broadening my knowledge and skills within my desired industry. I am looking forward to continuing to apply all that I learn to serve the members of the 104th Fighter Wing.



Bog Brook Military Kid's Camp in Gilead, Maine is an amazing camp for military children. The Children's ages can range from two to 16, and they are taught a variety of skillsets including; survival techniques, hiking, rappelling, swimming, archery, paintball and more.

This camp is generally limited to Maine Air and Army National Guard but was opened up to my daughter, Alessandra, when my wife, Tech. Sgt. Sue Fopiano, offered for us to be counselors to the children.

On the last full day with the children, we took them to Story Land Amusement Park near Mount Washington. It is the day the children look forward to but also dread as they know their week is nearly over.

I have been doing this for three years now and to say it's exhausting is an understatement, but so worthwhile.

The interaction with the children and being a stand in mom or dad for them is both a heartwarming and heart-wrenching experience that you will cherish for the rest of your life.

They are always looking for help; so if you have a week or two available to donate to children, please contact me and I will provide you the information.

We were presented Certificates of Appreciation from the Adjutant General of Maine— Brig. Gen. Douglas A. Farnham and we were thanked by the Governor of Maine's Wife, First Lady Ann Lepage.
