Pilot Dies Trying To Save 150

WESTFIELD—A Massachusetts Air National Guard jet fighter crashed about two miles north of Barnes Airport Saturday afternoon.

The pilot was killed when he "stayed with the craft too long" in an attempt to steer it from a crowded beach.

Officials said Capt John H. Paris, 33, of Newburgh, N.Y., ejected from the crippled F-86 at 1200 feet.

His body was recovered in Hampden Pond a mile from the crash site, according to Maj Fred Johnson, squadron operations officer for the 104th Tactical Fighter Group.

The plane burned in an open field. There were no injuries on the ground and no property damage.

Johnson said the plane was making a final approach to Barnes Airport when Paris radioed that the craft was in trouble.

He said the pilot apparently stayed with the plane for several seconds to avoid crashing near the pond where 150 persons were swimming.

A National Guard spokesman said Paris' parachute was intact, indicating that he was too low to the ground to make an effective parachute landing.

An Air Force board of inquiry was set up immediately to investigate the cause.

The crash occurred less than three miles from the place where Sen. Edward M. Kennedy was injured when a private plane crashed into an apple orchard in Southampton killing two men.

It was the third crash within a month to destroy a Massachusetts Air National Guard jet.

On June 30 an F-86 from the East Boston base struck a home in Haverhill, killing two children. The pilot had parachuted to safety moments before.

Ten days earlier still another F-86 from the Boston base was destroyed at Hanscom Field, Bedford, when emergency ground equipment had to be used to bring it to a halt. There were no serious injuries.

M'Cormack Visits Ted

House Speaker McCormack dropped in on recuperating Sen. Edward Kennedy Saturday and held a private 40-minute talk on the sunporch of New England Baptist Hospital.

Hospital officials reported that Kennedy continues to make satisfactory progress in recovering from injuries sustained in a June 19 plane crash.

Mrs. Patricia Lawford, a sister, and Mrs. Joan Kennedy, the senator's wife, were frequent visitors during the week.

An aide said the senator reads "as much as the hospital staff will allow," including mail, official correspondence and several popular books.

Malden Starts Housing Plan

Groundbreaking for Malden's first non-profit private housing for the elderly, will be held Monday noon at Salem and Pierce sts. with leading public and civic leaders taking part.

The 81-unit housing, sponsored by the Beth Israel Senior Citizens Housing, Inc., of Malden, will be open to persons 62 years old and over and who reside within a 15 mile radius of the site.

Taking part in the ceremony will be Gov. Peabody, Cong. Torbert MacDonald, Mayor Walter J. Kelliher, Frank Trentacosti Jr., acting chief, Community Services Division, Housing and Home Finance Agency; Judge Louis H. Glaser, president of the corporation and Rabbi Charles Weinberg, trustee and spiritual leader of Congregation Beth Israel.

Tenants will be selected on a non-sectarian basis at moderate rents according to the housing officials. The site is at the old Faulkner School and will house a building of brick, glass and concrete.

Judge Glaser said the groundbreaking represents "the climax of our efforts which began in 1961 after Rabbi Charles Weinberg returned from a White House Conference on the Aging."
